2011 Lavender Row L'Ile de Beaute, France Pinot Noir

Most of France's wine appellations are limited to a very small number of grape varieties.

When you think of Bordeaux, you think mainly of Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot. When you think of Burgundy, you think mainly of Pinot Noir and Chardonnay. It has been that way for centuries, influenced by both tradition and by law.

But there is one relatively small appellation where pretty much anything goes. It is L'lle de Beaute, the name given to the French island of Corsica, which sits in the Mediterranean Sea between the western coast of Tuscany and the southeastern coast of Provence. With more then 40 varieties under vine, Corsica could be viewed as a big experimental vineyard, surrounded by water.

With its L'Ile de Beaute Pinot Noir, Lavender Row seeks to capture the essence of its Mediterranean homeland. It's a floral, fruitful wine with a light mouthfeel — an island paradise in a wine glass.
